STOCKLAND GREEN ISN'T AS GREEN AS IT CAN BE, BUT WE CAN DO SOMETHING TO CHANGE THIS.



An article on what our school can do to help the ever increasing environmental crisis, and how we can all play our part.



Over the recent years, *Stockland Green* has made fantastic progress in our mission to keep the local area clean and reduce the amount of plastic and non-recyclable waste produced by the school. This, however, is just not enough.

As a fairly new student and life long resident of the local area, I have come to notice that the people around me (specifically within school) treat our streets as though they were a dustbin: somewhere to throw whatever they don't want aside, not thinking for one moment about the repercussions such a simple yet extremely harmful action has on the world around us.

Despite what some may think, the state of the environment is no joke.

Those who deny that our actions are having grave consequences on the state of the earth are the exact people who are hindering our progress as a species. The amount of litter that I see dropped by students of my school on and outside of school grounds is absolutely disgusting.

I for one am utterly ashamed to live somewhere that allows this kind of thing to occur every day. It shocks me that despite the constant evidence shown to us that this behaviour is damaging to our surroundings, that people (specifically young people) continue not to care: only acting for themselves without thinking about what they are doing to our environment.

I have collected complaints from people in our school, and have gone out of my way to ask what others believe are the biggest problems in our school related to the environment.

One of the things both teachers and students have complained about is the plastic bottles of water that are available for purchase in our cafeteria. Plastic water bottles, as if it even needs to be written, should *not* be

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served in our cafeteria. They are both unnecessary (due to the fact that we already have easily accessible, clean water fountains located on the ground floor that dispense fresh, ice cold drinking water) and bad for the planet.

Tell me, why do we need them?

Is their only purpose being to make money, despite the negative impact just one bottle has on the world around us?

Even if they do boast the fact they are "widely recycled", this still is ignoring the impracticality of a product like this, and how "widely recycled" doesn't always guarantee that they won't end up in the same landfill as all the other needless plastic items.

Speaking of recycling, the lack of recycling bins (more importantly the lack of advice given by teachers on when to use them and for which products that we sell) is highly alarming to me as someone who believes recycling plays a huge part in our fight against climate change.

Every day, I see non-recyclable items (which should not even be available in our school in the first place) put in the recycling bins, and recyclable items (which seem to be quite a rarity) put into the general waste bins.

What I'm really trying to say is that we need more bins, and better signage on how and when to use them. The fact that we're not doing this already shows that our heads are just not in the game, and we need to **wake up**.

I ask, how can we call ourselves an ECO-school when such ignorant be-

UNITED IN REMEMBRANCE




The Humanities Department completed work with students enabling them to use their creativity to celebrate Remembrance Day.

LEADING THE WAY FOR UP-AND-COMING SPORTING TALENT



